### Vector Images - Thousands to Purchase!

In the last Bulletin I mentioned that Corel Draw came with many vector images. This is the first place you should look when you need a vector image for your project. However, if you can't find anything in Corel's extensive library it may be that you need to purchase a vector image.

Images used to be very expensive. I remember even in the late 1980's it could cost over a thousand dollars for one image or illustration. The whole market in images has changed dramatically. When you have someone like Abode coming out and offering vector images for \$5.95 each, you know the days of very expensive art are over. It also means that anyone with Corel Draw can now turn out high quality documents with professional images for not a lot of money.



## Vector Images - Now Available from Many Vendors

You needn't pay a lot today for images. I use several different library's and they all have thousands of images to choose from. They also cater to different markets.

Some like Fotolia and Shutterstock sell both high rez bitmaps and vector images. The bitmaps are great if you are searching for that perfect photo for your document. However, Corel Draw is a vector software package. This means that using Draw you can utilise the full power of vector images.

Photographs are bitmap images. This means the larger you make them the more unclear they become, and as they are made really large you will actually see the square 'bits' they are made up off. Whereas a vector image will remain sharp no matter how large you make it.



Currently my favourite place to buy vector images is from Vector State. They only sell vector images and are currently very economical. I paid \$45 American for a 12 months subscription which allows me to download 100 images per month. That is exceptionally well priced. You do have to check the licencing agreements with all these sites, but most will allow you to use the images in any commercial application. What they won't allow is to on-sell any of their images.
